Dr Lynelle Johnson, DVM, MS, PhD, Diplomate American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine (Small Animal Internal Medicine), Associate Professor, University of California, Davis.

Dr. Johnson received her DVM from The Ohio State University, was in private practice on Long Island for 3 years, and completed a Masters Degree and residency program at the University of Illinois. She is Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine. Dr. Johnson's Masters research investigated an experimental model of feline asthma, and she completed a post-doctoral fellowship in radiation oncology at Colorado State University. She received a grant from the National Institute of Health Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute to study the effects of exercise on pulmonary vascular function and received her Ph.D. in Physiology from the University of Missouri in 2000.

Dr. Johnson is the respiratory section editor for the 5 Minute Veterinary Consult and Feline Internal Medicine Secrets, and she has manuscripts in various textbooks and journals. Dr. Johnson is a member of the Veterinary and Comparative Respiratory Society.

Her research interests include pulmonary vascular biology, cardiopulmonary interactions, and clinical respiratory disease of dogs and cats.

Dr David Maggs, BVSc (Hons), Diplomate American College of Veterinary Ophthalmologists, Associate Professor, Ophthalmology University of California, Davis, CA USA.

Following graduation, David spent 2 years in mixed practice in Victoria before leaving for what was supposed to be a 1-year tour of duty as a locum in the UK. That is now 19 years ago! After 3 years working in numerous practices throughout England, Scotland, and Wales, he completed small animal and equine internships at Colorado State University and residency training in comparative ophthalmology at the University of Missouri. Since December 2000, David has been on faculty at the University of California-Davis, where he is currently an Associate Professor.

David's major clinical interests are ophthalmic surgery and infectious ocular disease, while his research focus is ocular disease associated with the herpesviruses. He is a member of the European Feline Advisory Board, Secretary of the International Society of Veterinary Ophthalmology and author of the latest edition of "Slatter's Fundamentals of Veterinary Ophthalmology.
